Key Stone Age Facts

- The Stone Age period is said to have started around 3 million years ago when humans started to live in Europe.
- The Stone Age was followed by the Bronze Age period. This is when humans started to use metal.
- The Bronze Age was followed by the Iron Age when tools and weapons became more advanced and were used for farming, hunting and fighting.
- During the Palaeolithic Age (old Stone Age), people gathered food by hunting wild animals and birds, fishing, and collecting fruits and nuts.
- During the Neolithic Age (towards end of the Stone Age), the humans formed settled communities, and domesticated plants and animals for the first time in history.

Subject Specific Vocabulary

Archaeologist	People who discover our history by looking at artefacts that have been found.
Artefact	An object made by human beings usually with historical or cultural interest.
Neolithic	The later part of the Stone Age and following the Palaeolithic and Mesolithic Age.
B.C.	Before Christ. The date 250BC means 250 years before Christ was born. Also known as BCE (before common era).
Hunter- gatherer	People who mainly live by hunting, fishing and gathering wild food.


Science: Light

We see things because they are either **light sources** that make light (where light travels directly into our eyes) or they are nonlight sources that we can see because light **reflects** off them into our eyes. Some objects are **visible** because they are light

sources and some are visible because they reflect light.

We can classify objects as **transparent**, **translucent** or **opaque** depending on how light behaves when it hits them.

<u>All</u> surfaces and objects reflect some light.



How are shadows made?

Shadows are made when an **opaque** object blocks the path of light, which travels in straight lines. The shape of an object affects the shadow that it makes. Shadows cast by the sun change in length and direction during the day.
